

THE ULTIMATE SPANISH SUBJUNCTIVE CHEAT SHEET

Mastering Clauses: Expressing Reality, Emotions & Doubts

THE GOLDEN RULE

The Subjunctive is a **MOOD**, not a tense. Use it to express **subjectivity, emotions, doubts**, or things that are hypothetical / unknown.

Magic Formula: [Subject 1 + Verb 1] + **QUE** + [Subject 2 + Subjunctive Verb]

1. NOUN CLAUSES — The W.E.I.R.D.O. Triggers

Use the subjunctive when the main verb expresses a **WEIRDO** concept **and** there is a change of subject.

	Stands For	Trigger Verbs	Example
W	Wishes	<i>Quiero que, Espero que, Necesito que</i>	Quiero que estudies. — I want you to study.
E	Emotions	<i>Me alegra que, Siento que, Me molesta que</i>	Me alegra que vengas. — I am glad you are coming.
I	Impersonal	<i>Es importante que, Es necesario que</i>	Es importante que leas. — It is important that you read.
R	Recommendations	<i>Recomiendo que, Te aconsejo que</i>	Te aconsejo que duermas. — I advise you to sleep.
D	Doubt / Denial	<i>Dudo que, No creo que, No pienso que</i>	No creo que llueva. — I do not think it will rain.
O	Ojalá	<i>Ojalá (que) (I hope / God willing)</i>	¡Ojalá que ganemos! — I hope we win!

The Doubt Trap: "**Creo que**" (I believe) uses the **INDICATIVE** — certainty. "**No creo que**" uses the **SUBJUNCTIVE** — doubt.

2. ADVERB CLAUSES — Purpose and Time

Adverb clauses explain **how**, **why**, or **when** an action happens. Some connectors are **always subjunctive**; others depend on whether the event is future or habitual.

Rule	Connectors	Mood	Example
Always Subjunctive	<i>para que</i> (so that) <i>sin que</i> (without) <i>a menos que</i> (unless) <i>antes de que</i> (before)	Always SUBJUNCTIVE <i>(the action is an intention not yet met)</i>	<i>Te llamo para que sepas.</i> I call so that you know.
Time Travel Rule	<i>cuando</i> (when) <i>hasta que</i> (until) <i>tan pronto como</i> (as soon as)	Future event: SUBJUNCTIVE Habit / Past: INDICATIVE	<i>Future: Saldremos cuando llegues.</i> <i>Habit: Salimos cuando llegas.</i>

3. RELATIVE CLAUSES — The Hunt for the Unknown

Relative clauses describe a noun. The mood depends entirely on whether the noun **exists and is known** or **is unknown / desired**.

The Antecedent (the noun)	Mood	Example + Explanation
Specific / Known	INDICATIVE <i>(you know it exists)</i>	<i>Busco a la secretaria que habla inglés.</i> → I know her. She definitely exists.
Unknown / Desired	SUBJUNCTIVE <i>(it may not exist)</i>	<i>Busco una secretaria que hable inglés.</i> → Any secretary. I do not know her yet.
Negated (does not exist)	SUBJUNCTIVE <i>(nadie, ningún, etc.)</i>	<i>No conozco a nadie que hable ruso.</i> → No such person exists in my world.
